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Please plan to attend this week's **UMSA Wednesday Luncheon - Nov. 14** - in the Private Dining Room (11:45-1:00). Lunch will be served.

Our guest will be **David Esquivel**, an attorney at Bass, Berry, Sims in Nashville and an active layperson at **Belmont United Methodist Church**.

David will be speaking about his experiences as the **lead lawyer** in a major **human rights violations** case that found **Nicolas Carranza**, former Vice-Minister of Defense of **El Salvador**, liable for **crimes against humanity**. Carranza, who immigrated to the United States in 1985, had been the Vice-Minister of Defense from 1979-1981, when El Salvadoran Security Forces carried out "**widespread atrocities** against civilians, including opposition political figures, members of labor unions, and people who provided care and education to the public, such as teachers, doctors, rescue workers and priests. Experts estimate that **10,000 to 12,000** unarmed civilians were killed in 1980 alone, including revered Salvadoran **Archbishop Romero**" (The Center for Justice and Accountability,

What makes David's perspective particularly interesting is the fact that, being a former student of **Stanley Hauerwas** while studying law at Duke, David is not entirely uncritical of what it means to seek 'justice' and affirm 'human rights' in the modern, liberal tradition.
