Cheap Trick — Ryman Auditorium

Surrender... to the sweet music of Cheap Trick as they triumphantly return to Nashville this Thursday night for a concert at the world-famous Ryman Auditorium. This rock/power pop band has been rocking the stage since 1974 and have churned out several huge hits such as "I Want You To Want Me," "Surrender," and "Dream Police." Often described as the American Beatles (playing an Americanized form of what was British rock and pop), Cheap Trick has retained the same line-up since their inception, a feat not many other bands of their age can boast. Tickets are a bit expensive but well worth the price to see legends.

The Coolin' System — The Basement

Nashville's favorite funk band takes the stage at The Basement for an evening of grooving tunes. While they are not quite as popular as some of Nashville's other residents, The Coolin' System is fast becoming one of the aty's most talked about bands. As the Nashville Scene described in a recent article, "The Coolin' System might just be one of our favorite new bands in the whole aty. Their tight, instrumental funk workouts were so good... it's pretty obvious that this band thinks solely about the tunes." And people, it's the last Thursday night before exams. The Dave Rawlings Machine & Carl Broemel – Exit/In

While best known for his work with Gillian Welch and Old Crow Medicine Show, Dave Rawlings has assembled a band of friends to play his own solo compositions and songs. As a guitarist, singer, producer, and songwriter, Rawlings has quite the musical background, a strength that shines through on his recent debut release, "Friend of a Friend." Though he had written several songs over the last several years, it was not until 2007 that he began playing with the notion of assembling a full band and recording full versions of the songs. The music on the album is "cousin to the deftly modern and haunting music that [he] is known for, but it has here been expanded; the crowd is larger, the party more robust, but the room is the same room."

Opening for The Dave Rawlings Machine is guitarist Carl Broemel. While best known for his work as a member of My Morning Jacket as well as his earlier work with the bands Old Pike and Planet Earth, Broemel is an incredible musician in his own right. Having recently released a solo record, "Lose What's Left," Broemel has truly grown as a solo artist and now resides in Nashville, TN. No, it won't be like seeing My Morning Jacket, but instead this is a chance for a much more intimate experience with one of the biggest forces in the band. (\$20, 9:00 p.m., 2208 Elliston Place)

Mark Wehner Cd Release Party with Stephen Simmons – The

Mark Wehner appears to be releasing a CD but doing a poor job marketing it as information about him, his music, and what is coming out is hard to find. Wehner is a country singer with a sound sometimes described like that of Steve Earle. Opening for Wehner is the Americana singer songerwriter Stephen Simmons who features songs like "Devil's Work Is Never Done" and "County Lines." Simmons has a simple voice with simple acoustic guitar to go along. Probably the best part about this one it is free. (FREE, 6:30 p.m.)

EOTO/Phutureprimtive – Exit/In

Recently featuring the duo Pretty Lights (electronica/hip-hop) the Exit/In seems to be taking full advantage of the trendy music scene that packs in sweaty fans who just want to find that transcendental feeling. The electro-house "all improvised, nothing pre-recorded" group Eoto will make its way to the Exit/In this Friday. The group is composed of Jason Hann and Michael Travis formerly of the String Cheese Incident. Eoto has recently gotten some solid positive press.

Opening for EOTO will be the electronica act known as Phutureprimitive. Phutureprimitive mixes basic bongo drum with sounds found in nature (like rain) and actually come up with something fairly interesting. In a music world inundated with unoriginal losers with a Mac, this act stands out as unique and if you're in the right state of mind could provide quite a cool live experience. Richie McDonald – Country Music Hall of Fame, Ford Theater

Country singer Richie McDonald has a new single "Six-Foot Teddybear" and will perform this and other acoustic driven country tunes at the Country Music Hall at Ford Theater. McDonald is regarded as one of the better voices in Country Music today (Hence the Friday night spot at the big venue) and this single marks the beginning of his solo career. Richie is quite the performer and is apparently very much looking forward to his new gig as a solo act. (Price not listed, 8 p.m.)

Sones de Mexico Ensemble — Tennesee Performing Arts Center

This Chicago based folk ensemble is also a non-profit organization that is "committed to teaching young and old with many of its educational programs nationwide." The band plays music rooted in the Mexican "son" style with ever changing instrumentation and pretty harmonizing vocals. (Price not listed, 2 p.m.)

"Radio City Christmas Spectacular" – Grand Ole Opry

The high-kicking Rockettes and company continue their series in Nashville this Friday evening at the Grand Old Opry. Easily one of the most memorable events of Christmas time both in and out of New York City, the Radio City Christmas Spectacular is a show that you absolutely most see at least once in your life. Owl City, the synth-pop project of Adam Young, take the stage at the War Memorial Auditorium in downtown Nashville this evening. While Young created Owl City in 2007, it was not until 2009 that he reached a major level of success. With the major label debut, "Ocean Eyes," Owl City exploded in popularity, even reaching #1 on the Billboard Hot 100 with the single "Fireflies," a track that went on to become the fastest-selling electronic/alternative track in history. Alternative rock band The Fray return to Nashville tonight, bringing their pianofueled pop rock to War Memorial Auditorium alongside Owl City. Perhaps best described as an Americanized, less epic sounding Coldplay, The Fray is best known for writing emotionally charged ballads and power pop songs such as "Over My Head," "How to Save a Life," and "Never Say Never." Unde Kracker

Follow Uncle Kracker to the War Memorial this Saturday where he'll bring with him the hits he's best known for like "Follow Me," "Smile," and a re-recording of the Doobie Brother's "Drift Away." Singer Matthew Shafer's unique country/rock voice has kept him on the radio since the turn of the millennium. He has recently been getting more attention in the Country Scene then previously before, so he should be perfectly comfortable playing to a Nashville crowd. 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
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FROM THE EDITOR



Hot Spiced Cider 6 cups fresh apple cider


- 1/4 cup pure maple syrup (more or less, to taste)
- 2 cinnamon sticks 6 whole cloves
- 6 whole allspice berries
- 6 strips orange peel
- 6 strips lemon peel



Pour the apple cider and maple syrup into a large stainless steel saucepan. Place the cinnamon sticks, cloves, allspice berries, orange peel and lemon peel in the center of a washed square of cheesecloth; fold up the sides of the cheesecloth to enclose the bundle, then tie it up with kitchen string. Drop the spice bundle into the cider mixture. Place the saucepan over moderate heat for five to 10 minutes, or until the cider is very hot but not boiling. Remove cider from heat. Discard the spice bundle. Ladle the cider into big cups or mugs, adding a fresh cinnamon stick to each serving.

Christmas Eggnog

- 12 egg yolks
- 5 cloves, whole
- 4 cups milk
- 4 cups cream 3 cups light rum
- 1 ¾ cups sugar
- 2 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ground





In a saucepan over low heat, blend milk, cinnamon, cloves and half a teaspoon of vanilla extract. Stir while mixture heats and remove from heat just before boiling point. In a bowl, mix together the sugar with egg volks. Whisk well so they're light and fluffy. Gently and a little at a time, pour in milk mixture while continuing to whisk. Transfer back into saucepan over a medium heat while continuing to stir. Keep stirring until mixture starts to resemble custard. Never let the mixture reach boiling point. Strain the mixture into a jug and remove the cloves. Place jug in the fridge for an hour or two. Gently stir in the cream, rum, remaining vanilla and ground nutmeg. Put back into fridge overnight. Serve in cups with extra ground nutmeg, cinnamon or baking cocoa sprinkled lightly on top.



with a name like Buzz, he


or the film is an anomaly that inspires devotion and respect despite its obvious shortcomings. #





December Movie Preview Many films contend for best picture

The holiday season is awards season: Most films that win "Best Picture" at the Academy Awards premiere between November and January. Take "A Beautiful Mind" (2001), "Chicago" (2002), "No Country for Old Men" (2007), "Slumdog Millionaire" (2008) - the list goes on.

Back in June, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences announced that 10 films, as opposed to the usual five, will contend at the March 7 (the ceremony was pushed back from its usual spot in February to avoid competition with the Olympics) Academy Awards for the title of "Best Picture." The motivation for this move likely stems from the recent exclusion of popular films, like 2009's "The Dark Knight," from "Best Picture" nominations in favor of independent, art-house films (three of the five nominees that year earned under \$25 million domestically).

With twice as many candidates, the upcoming "Best Picture" competition will be more exciting than ever. 2009 has seen a fair share of renowned films so far, like "The Hurt Locker," about an American Explosive Ordnance Disposal in Iraq, and the recently-released "The Road," based on Cormac McCarthy's bestselling book.

Plenty of possible nominees are scheduled for December release. Premiering on Dec. 4 is "Brothers," starring Jake Gyllenhaal as a drifter who cares for the family of his brother Sam (Tobey Maguire), a captain in the army who is presumed dead in Iraq. He and Sam's wife, Grace (Natalie Portman) slowly grow close, only to have their relationship interrupted when Sam miraculously returns. The film boasts an excellent, all-star cast and a strong present-day relevancy.

Also coming Dec. 4 is "Invictus," which, from the previews, looks like inspirational-based-on-atrue-story sports movie elevated by an unusually interesting background

Nelson Mandela's efforts to use South Africa's underdog rugby team to help unite the torn post-apartheid country — and the presence of Matt Damon and Morgan Freeman (as Mandela). Furthermore, the film was directed by the always-dependable Clint Eastwood, whose "Gran Torino" (2008) was controversially snubbed of any Oscar nominations last year — a mistake the Academy may be looking

James Cameron's ultra-hyped scifi adventure "Avatar" will be released on Dec.18 and had better be an Oscar contender if it hopes to earn back its budget, reported to be near \$500 million. Cameron did it before with "Titanic" (1999), taking in 11 Oscars and close to \$2 billion in international gross.

25 will see the premiere of "The Lovely Bones," directed by Peter Jackson. The story, based on the 2002

book by Alice Sebold, focuses a murdered girl's observations of her family and her killer from heaven. After "The Lord of the Rings" (2001-2003) and "King Kong" (2005), one can only have high expectations for Jackson's next movie.

Already the winner of numerous awards including the 2009 Palme d'Or, the highest prize at the Caanes Film Festival, "The White Ribbon" is a strong contender for the "Best Foreign Language Film" award. The movie, primarily in German with English subtitles, tells the story of a pre-WWI village stricken by a series of mysterious accidents. Director Michael Haneke has quite a track-record — his 2005 film "Cache" was recently named the best film of the decade by "The Times of London." "The White Ribbon" is set for limited U.S. release on Dec. 30.

We'll all find out for sure when the Academy Award nominees are announced Feb. 2, 2010. For now, enjoy the holidays and see some good movies. #

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
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

Latest New Releases

John Mayer stays true to pop

Those of us who hoped that John Mayer's last two releases (the phenomenal pop-blues compilation "Continuum" and the hard edged electric blues live album with his trio, "Try!") were foreshadowing the shedding of yet another, perhaps final, layer of his pop skin on "Battle Studies" should go ahead and toss that hope aside. Mayer has said, "As a pop musician, I want to be the prism for taking what I know is a very powerful style of music (blues) and somehow crystallizing it into something that is identifiable as being now." If this is his goal on "Battles Studies," unfortunately

he is no closer than with his last attempt on "Continuum." In this respect, "Continuum' was no failure it took steps few others have attempted, like a perfect cover of Hendrix's "Bold As Love", and "Battle Studies" only falls short in its inability to top its predecessor.

With this in mind, the new album is a strong pop performance Mayer's musicianship and guitar virtuosity

do not fall between the cracks. The pop star's very public love life and breakups shine throughout the whole album, but especially on the first three tracks, "Heartbreak Warfare", "All We Ever Do Is Say Goodbye" and "Half Of My Heart (with Taylor Swift)." The three are throwbacks to the John Mayer of "Room for Squares," full of multilayered harmonies, soft acoustic guitar and somewhat lame lyrics

Any musician will tell you that that order of songs on an album plays an important role, and what the opening three on this record scream is soft-rock, acoustic-pop. Bizarrely enough, as soon as Swift whispers her final line, Mayer throws in "Who Says," with the simple and funny line "Who says I can't get stoned?" This helps shift the whole tone of "Battle Studies." On "Perfectly Lonely," complete with the raw guitar and passionate vocals Trio fans yearn for, subtle vocal harmonies from drummer Steve Jordan in just the right spots and simple instrumentation give it the understated feel of the blues-rock Mayer is so good at, and it leaves him room to explore.

A la "Continuum" s "Bold As Love," Mayer covers a blues classic with Robert Johnson's "Crossroads." He takes the tune in a different direction, and certainly has the chops to pull it off, but it seems unnecessary. A superb finale, the opposite is true with "I'm On Fire" (Bruce Springsteen), as the slow acoustic ballad finds Mayer at his best vocally.

"Battles Studies" shows flashes of brilliance and overall warrants a listen through several times over. The production is strong and musicianship on point. It is unclear, however, if this is the John Mayer we can continue to expect or whether the young artist is still struggling through a musical identity crisis — "Am I a pop musician, or am I a blues-guitar God?" Unfortunately, in the MTV generation of impatience (especially with music), many gems of the album that lack radio appeal will fall by the

The Brayery get dark and angry

The Bravery's latest release, "Stir the Blood," is quite the departure from the sound the band has taken over the last few years. Starting with a very synth-heavy pop sound, The Bravery exploded in popularity in 2005 with their single "An Honest Mistake," a track that sounded like a darker version of the recently recognized superstars The Killers. On the bands debut album, "The Sun and the Moon," however, The Bravery lighted up a bit, opting instead for more driving songs that were laced with keyboards that served more of a supporting role than before. With songs

like "Time Won't Let Me Go," the synth hooks were the icing on the cake for layered guitars driving drums.

With third album, the band has once again taken a new direction, this time a much more drastic one. As the title suggests, it is, in a word, angry. It's dark, menacing, it's mean. Gone are most of the normalpoplyrical sentiments; gone is any real

musicwiremag.com lightness of tone. Sure, you can still tell it's The Bravery – their sound has certain inescapable hallmarks (the vocals, the emphasis on electronics, etc). But this time around, it's more like The Bravery crossed with Nine Inch Nails, The Cure, or The Misfits. Upon even the first listen, there is a strong attitude and feelings of resentment and rage that pervade

From the lyrics of the lead track which reiterates that the singer truly feels he was "born to be adored", this dark tone and attitude doesn't let up. Take for example the chorus of the, well, creepily titled "Hatefuck" which repeats "there will be no tenderness / I will show no mercy for you / you have no mercy for me / the only thing that I ask, love me mercilessly." This is The Bravery pissed off at past friends, lost loves, and regrets. This is lyricist and singer Sam Endicott pissed off at the world.

But while the lyrics remain so dark and angry, the music stays extremely upbeat. This creates one of the oddest disparities in recent releases - while hearing Endicott sing of merciless love and loss, the listener is strangely compelled to dance. The lyrics may be as dark as ever but the music stays catchy as hell from start to finish.

Despite the consistency of the album's style, there are some songs that just don't fit. On "She's So Bendable," The Bravery do their best MGMT imitation, but it doesn't quite work. The strangest track, however, is the album closer, "Sugarpill," a song that sounds leftover from the Pixies' "Doolittle" sessions. With a slow tempo, airy feel, drawling, off-key vocals and subtle background singing and light, distorted yet sparkling guitars, "Sugarpill" sticks out like a sore thumb.

All in all, "Stir the Blood" is very odd yet fairly entertaining album. It's certainly darker than expected, and it undoubtedly fall short of any expectations I had after their fantastic last release. But in it's own merits, "Stir the Blood" is, at best, interestingly enjoyable. #

With a greater knowledge of musical theory and improved technique gained over the past year, Golden's musicianship reflects a new confidence and originality. His new EP, recorded both in Dallas and Nashville, is an eclectic blend of sonic textures. Parts of it, such as the "Standing in the Crowd" or "Pretty Lies," have mellow, jazzy elements that remind me of the Dave Matthews Band or other improvisational artists. The choruses are uplifting and soaring like a one-man Polyphonic Spree. "The Beach Song" gives Golden a chance to flex his upper range and use a clear falsetto that meshes with the backing flute.

From a brief foray into electronica with the upbeat track "Samsara," available on his Facebook page, we've seen that Golden can cover more musical territory than the more standard ballads. His debut EP showcases his talent without feeling overproduced, but Golden says he plans to record an upcoming album with an even more visceral feel and sparser backing instrumentation. "The songs are good enough at this point to stand on their own," Golden told me. "They don't need anything to boost their ego".

For Golden, the songs don't need to be overly complex or heavily produced. They don't need anything extra. Such an approach would only weaken the song. Instead, Golden focuses on the actual soul of the song. With this more simplistic approach to writing and recording, Golden is avoiding much of the current trends of music.

The Boss connects generations and rocks in Nashville

Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band filled the Sommet Center with three hours of booming classical rock on Wednesday, November 18. The first words out of Springsteen's mouth were "I was raised out of steel here in the swamps of Jersey, some misty years ago," a bluntly autobiographical line from the group's most recent song, "Wrecking Ball," which premiered in late September.

The college dropout from New Jersey had plenty of surprises in store for Wednesday's performance, the third-to-last in a massive two-year long tour. Springsteen, as energetic and alive onstage as ever, began with more of the group's more recent work before diving, literally, back to his oldie pop-hit roots – the audience carried him as he performed his first chart-topping single "Hungry Heart." Encore piece "Dancing in the Dark" saw one of many on-stage appearances by audience members, and Springsteen took song requests by snatching labeled signs from the nearby crowd.

One such request led to a hilarious performance of "Santa Claus is Coming to Town," complete with Santa Hats and "Ho-Ho-Ho"'s from saxophonist Clarence Clemmons. The group gave a shout-out to music city by playing Johnny Cash's "Ring of Fire" for the first time ever, and the night closed with another cover: Jackie Wilson's "(Your Love Keeps Lifting Me) Higher and


Springsteen's repertoire, as complex and multifaceted as its songs can be, is quite square compared to most collegeage music today; the teenagers and young adults in the audience seemed dwarfed numerically by the forty-and-up crowd. Indeed, the middle-aged fans sung along the most enthusiastically, gleefully shouting the innocent key line "Everybody's got a hungry heart" during Springsteen's audience-surfing escapade.

There was a day when twenty-year-olds idolized Springsteen's ferocious charge – just watch him shout – no – roar blistering antiwar pronouncements in the video for "Born in the U.S.A." Now, Springsteen doesn't stand a just a third of the concert. ##

chance – rap dominates young adult's iTunes and the Boss is sixty years old. Wednesday, Springsteen resigned himself to donning a continuous smile while the mellow and caustic material was mostly dropped in favor of straightforward love fables like "Rosalita (Come Out Tonight)," still jaw-dropping live.

The centerpiece was a full-length performance of the 1975 album "Born to Run," which, as he explained to the audience, saved the ailing young group with its widespread commercial and critical success (it ranked 18th on Rolling Stone's 500 Greatest Albums of All Time).

From the endlessly inspiring title track to the epic closing piece "Jungleland," featuring Clemmons' awing saxophone solo, the crowded audience of the Sommet Center was drawn back to the days when Springsteen was a young dreamer reaching for the stars. In a hit-driven age that often seems to have forgotten the value of a cohesive album it was refreshing, to say the least, to experience a masterwork like "Born to Run" from start to finish. 

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


