Program Title: "Legislating From the Bench": The Judicial Role in Our Constitutional Democracy

Program Description: The proper role of the judiciary in our constitutional democracy has become a hot political topic. From the U.S. Supreme Court's 2000 decision in Bush v. Gore, to the Terry Schiavo matter, commentators and politicians have debated the propriety of judicial decision making in such cases. Yet a broader historical perspective helps us to appreciate that claims of "judicial activism" are as old as the Republic itself.

In this colloquium, presenters Mark Brandon, Professor of Law, Stefanie Lindquist, Associate Professor of Political Science and Law, and senior Political Science majors Thomas Traxler and Lawrence Staten, explore the nature of judicial activism both theoretically and practically. Their presentations will help to unravel the complexities associated with the debate over constitutional roles and boundaries.

Stop the Execution of Daryl Holton

Daryl Holton now stands less than five days from death. Unless the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals overrules the District Court's finding that Holton is competent (despite diagnosed mental illness), he will be executed at 1:00 am Tuesday, September 19th. As people of conscience, we are called to stand up and oppose such a grievous miscarriage of justice. TCASK events and vigils will occur around the state. See below for an event in your area.

Nashville

On Monday, September 18th, we will gather at 4:30 at Legislative Plaza for a rally and press conference to make public our opposition to a failed and immoral public policy. At 5:00 we will march up Charlotte Avenue, around the Capitol and Bicentennial Park, and over the James Robertson Pkwy Bridge to Holy Name Catholic Church.

At 6:30 pm we will hold an ecumenical prayer service at Holy Name, located at 521 Woodland Street to pray for Daryl Holton, all those on death row, and all of those who have been victimized by violent crime.

At 9:30 we will begin a vigil at Riverbend Correctional Facility which we will maintain until the execution or a stay is in place.
