February 16 & 17--Christ Church Cathedral--Dr. Larry Rasmussen, Reinhold Niebuhr Professor Emeritus of Social Ethics at Union Theological Seminary, NYC, will be discussing the life and legacy of theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer struggled with what it meant to be a Christian within the Nazi state, probing questions that matter in all times and places. Bonhoeffer's beliefs resulted in his execution by the Nazi regime. His struggles and his example continue to inspire. The Friday evening program begins at 5:15 with a reception, followed by dinner at 6:00 pm (reservations required). Dr. Rasmussen's presentation begins at 7:00 pm. The Saturday morning presentation begins at 9:00 am and ends at noon. The cost of the event is \$25 (\$15 for students), dinner included. Childcare is available on request.
