Jim Wallis is a Christian leader for social change. He is a speaker, author, activist, and international commentator on ethics and public life. Wallis was a founder of Sojourners – Christians for justice and peace – more than 30 years ago and continues to serve as the editor of *Sojourners* magazine, covering faith, politics and culture. His books include *Faith Works* (2000), *The Soul of Politics: A Practical and Prophetic Vision for Change* (1994), *Who Speaks for God? A New Politics of Compassion, Community, and Civility* (1996), *Call to Conversion* (1981).

The Cole Lectures were established by Colonel E. W. Cole in 1893 for the "defense and advocacy of the Christian Religion." Since that time the lectures have been delivered by such distinguished scholars as Harry Emerson Fosdick, George Buttrick, Rudolph
