ALLAN M. BRANDT

The Vanderbilt Institute for Public Policy Studies is pleased to introduce Professor Allan M. Brandt as the Eighth Annual Public Policy Lecturer. Professor Brandt will present a lecture entitled "AIDS: From Public History to Public Policy".

Professor Brandt began his teaching career at Harvard University in 1982. He was named the Amalie Moses Kass Professor of History of Medicine at Harvard Medical School's department of social medicine in 1992. He is also Professor of the History of Science at Harvard University. His academic credentials include a B.A. from Brandeis University, with M.A., M. Phil., and Ph.D. degrees from Columbia University.

Professor Brandt is probably best known for his book, No Magic Bullet: A Social History of Venereal Diseases in the United States Since 1880, a work that focuses on the relationship among risk, behavior and disease in twentieth century America. This book, published in 1985, brought him a nomination for a Pulitzer Prize and a finalist position for the Los Angeles Times Book Critic Award.

But he is also widely known as an outstanding teacher and lecturer at Harvard, where he teaches history of medicine and science to undergraduates as well as to medical and graduate students; and at medical schools and health care establishments around the country, where, we have been told, he is considered a star. His course on the history of medicine is the largest in the U.S., with over 300 enrolled.

He is currently at work on three projects: a book on the social and cultural history of cigarette smoking, a social history of illegal abortion in the United States, and a work detailing the social and ethical issues relating to AIDS policy. His major research interests are the social history of American medicine and science, ethics and values in health care, and American social and political history.

Professor Brandt is a Charles E. Culpeper Scholar in the Medical Humanities and served on the National Academy of Sciences Committee on Monitoring the Social Impact of AIDS.

He lives in Newton, Massachusetts, with his wife and two children, both boys, ages two and four. His hobbies all center around his family.



CLIFFORD S. RUSSELL
Director of the Vanderbilt Institute

Clifford S. Russell joined the Vanderbilt faculty as professor of economics and director of the Institute in January 1986.

Before coming to Vanderbilt, Russell was a senior fellow at Resources for the Future, an environmental policy research organization in Washington, D.C. During his 17-year tenure there, he held a number of leadership positions, including that of director of the Quality of the Environment Division. He also served as an adjunct faculty member at the University of Maryland and the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. Author or editor of a dozen books and some 60 articles, he has concentrated his research on facets of pollution control policy and water resources management. He came to VIPPS with a strong commitment to and experience in interdisciplinary research.

Russell has served as a member of National Academy of Science committees on multimedia approaches to pollution control and environmental research assessment, and on the Environmental Studies Board. In 1992/93 he chaired an NAS panel evaluating the U.S. Department of Energy's system for setting clean-up priorities at contaminated nuclear weapons and research facilities. During 1993 and 1994 he will be president of the Association of Environmental and Resource Economists.

In Tennessee, he is president of the board of the Tennessee Environmental Council and a member of the Governor's Energy Advisory Board.

He received his B.A. in mathematics, summa cum laude, from Dartmouth College and his Ph.D. from Harvard University, where he was a Harvard Graduate Prize Fellow in Economics. From 1960 through 1963, he served as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Navy.
